Dr. Porte says that, while being a doctor in a shelter means being paid less and doing harder work, it answers Christ's call to do justice. "For someone who has a lot," he says, "comes responsibility." What do you think Christ's call to justice means for you?



Dr. Olushoga said yes to the request to go into the shelters as a psychiatrist, even when she was pregnant, with all the risks and uncertainties. "I wish I could say I was drawn because I wanted to help the people so much," she says, "but I think I said yes in a dutiful way," in order to support the team. "But today," she says, "I can say that working in the shelters is one of my favorite and most meaningful things I do," even if it "drops me to my knees because I don't feel equipped to do it."
